

Eugene Scheel has created more than 50 historical maps covering Virginia, other states, and foreign nations. He has authored nine books on Virginia history, including *The Civil War in Fauquier* and the Friends' five-volume series *Loudoun Discovered: Communities, Corners, and Crossroads* (see page 4).

Born in the Bronx, New York, Scheel has lived in the Piedmont of Virginia since 1965. He holds a bachelor's degree in geography from Clark University, a graduate degree in planning from the University of Virginia School of Architecture, and a graduate degree in American Literature from Georgetown University.

#### Rotary and Friends Team Up to Create Compelling Video History of Leesburg's Premier Jeweler and Beloved Resident Stanley Caulkins

Over the past few years, the Friends have video recorded and edited various Leesburg and Loudoun individuals for permanent preservation of their stories. Their stories are important, but even more important is the fact that we are capturing the stories in their own words. But because of limited funding, the Friends have typically recorded only one individual per year even though there are many people whose stories should be preserved.

This year, through special contributions, we were able to capture the comments of Stanley Caulkins, Leesburg's premier jeweler for over 60 years and beloved citizen. Funding was provided by the Rotary Club of Leesburg,




#### LOUDOUN DISCOVERED: Communities, Corners & Crossroads


Some 40 years ago, Eugene Scheel, local historian and mapmaker, wrote a series of articles for the Loudoun Times-Mirror showcasing more than 100 Loudoun County communities. While the articles were archived at Thomas Balch Library, the Friends' organization decided to publish them in a form that would make them available to many more people. The stories were divided into five geographical volumes: 1: Eastern Loudoun: Goin' Down the Country, 2: Leesburg and the Old Carolina Road, 3: The Hunt Country and Middleburg, 4: Quaker Country and the Loudoun Valley, 5: Waterford, the German Settlement and Between the Hills. \$20 per volume, \$10 for Scheel's accompanying map, or \$100 five-volume set with map.

#### Two-Volume Set Introduces African Americans Who Shaped the History and Character of Loudoun County

THE ESSENCE OF A PEOPLE I: Portraits of African Americans Who Made a Difference in Loudoun County, Virginia is the first publication of the Friends' Black History Committee, evolving from the committee's outreach to the Loudoun County community to solicit nominations for the naming of a Thomas Balch Library room in honor of an African American. After considerable deliberation, Howard W. Clark, Sr., of Hamilton, was selected, but the committee concluded that the other 20 some nominees also deserved to be honored. To that purpose, The Essence of a People was published in 2001 with additional material, including family stories, and photographs. To provide perspective, a brief essay on African Americans in Loudoun County is included. \$15.

The second volume in the series—THE ESSENCE OF A PEOPLE II: African Americans Who Made






Their World Anew in Loudoun County, Virginia, and Beyond—profiles 16 largely unacknowledged or forgotten individuals who made singular contributions to the County's history. Among them are Charles Fenton Simms, the largest private benefactor of Loudoun Hospital, and Daniel Dangerfield, Loudoun's most famous fugitive slave. Published October 2002. \$15.


## Titles That Explore Loudoun's Rich Black Heritage

#### LOUDOUN COUNTY'S AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITIES: A Tour Map and Guide

This full-color, illustrated, 24-page booklet with map takes you on a trip through Loudoun County's rich black history. Beginning largely in the post-emancipation period, African Americans built homes, schools, churches, fraternal lodges, and businesses throughout the County. Some communities have died out while others have remained vital; many buildings survive despite changes in the landscape. A narrative introduction and brief descriptions of 44 settlements and neighborhoods are enhanced by 32 illustrations and a fold-out map marked with communities, churches and schools. Published May 2004. \$5









#### IN THE WATCHFIRES: The Loudoun County Emancipation Association, 1890-1971

The late Elaine E. Thompson presents a well-documented and informed interpretation of the Loudoun County Emancipation Association that contributes not only to local history but also to African American and U.S. history. Emancipation Day celebrations come to life in its pages and illuminate the community that created them. The celebrations chapter and the epilogue, written in the first person, are rich and evocative. The biographical directory pays tribute to many men and women whose civic contributions might otherwise go unrecognized. Illustrations, maps, and photographs enhance the book. Published June 2005. \$20.





#### Anniversary Lecture Series & Journey Through Time

The Friends also offers DVDs of the Library's lecture series for Loudoun's and Leesburg's 250th anniversaries. \$15 each. *Journey Through Time* is a timeline of events affecting African Americans in Loudoun. \$5.

#### Billy Pierce of Purcellville & George Washington Carver


In George Washington Carver: Scientist, Artist & Musician, the late scholar and author Lemoine DeLeaver Pierce explores the little known artistic talents of Dr. Carver. In Billy Pierce: Dance Master, Son of Purcellville, she captured the life of her father-in-law, who was born to truck farmers in Purcellville. Educated at Storer College and Howard University, Billy Pierce became a journalist and reported on the Harlem Renaissance for the *Chicago Defender*. He went on to own the world's largest stage dance studio known for catering to Broadway stars. He's credited with creating the "Black Bottom" national dance craze. Both books are published by the Friends' Black History Committee. Carver, \$10; Pierce, \$15.




